## One-day example itinerary

### 11:30am – GUIDED TOUR OF NEWSTEAD ABBEY

Arrive at this charming estate and enjoy a one-hour character-led guided tour with Byron himself as he lets you in on secrets of his scandalous life and breath-taking poetry. Hear how Byron spent his time at Newstead, from decadent parties to his love of swimming in the lake, as you explore the stately rooms filled with antiques, paintings, and curiosities. Discover why he went from being adored by the masses to becoming the 'mad, bad and dangerous to know' poet in exile. Learn about his family roots in the area, his links to the local Luddite movement, and how he spoke out in parliament for the lacemakers of Nottingham.

Once the tour is finished, you will be invited to indulge in a traditional afternoon tea with Byron. Taking place in the Abbey's rustic Victorian Kitchen or the delightfully airy Garden Room, enjoy a selection of fine finger sandwiches, tea, cakes and scones.

Afterwards there is optional free time to explore the beautiful grounds and enjoy the blend of wild beauty and stately charm that inspired Byron himself.

#### By train:


Depart London St Pancras Station 8.34am

Depart London 8.00am  
Arrive Newstead Abbey approximately 11.00am

### USEFUL INFORMATION

- Coach travel is recommended due to the semi-rural location of Newstead Abbey.
- The journey time by road is estimated on travel from London Victoria Coach Station.
- Regular trains from London St Pancras to Newstead (via Nottingham) are operated by East Midlands Trains.
- Allow a 35-minute walk from Newstead train station to the Abbey, or a 15 minute taxi ride.
- Transport is not included.

### AFTERNOON – FREE TIME TO EXPLORE THE SURROUNDING AREA

From Newstead Abbey you may wish to take the short journey to St. Mary Magdalene Church where Lord Byron is buried in the family vault, or a little further to wander around the pretty market town of Southwell where Byron spent many summer holidays.

Just a few miles from Newstead is Britain's finest working Victorian water pumping station, Papplewick Pumping Station\*. Visit this fine example of beautiful Victorian craftsmanship, boasting a range of original features, and now protected as a Scheduled Ancient Monument.

Alternatively, you may prefer to spend the afternoon exploring Nottingham and discover the city's great modern culture and historic past.

#### COACH PARKING

##### DROP OFF/PICK UP:

Coach parking is available at Newstead Abbey and Papplewick Pumping Station\*. **Pre-booking is required.**

Nottingham City Centre has several coach drop-off and pick-up points with coach parks on the city outskirts.
