
## Homintern: Homosexual Internationalism and Modern Culture

He has undertaken conservation volunteering work in the UK, Peru, and Uganda in the aim of both developing his experience and supporting good causes.

Calum's most recent trip was to Uganda, in order to undertake a voluntary role with the Queen Elizabeth Parks Project.



This talk will describe Calum's tasks, challenges and experiences, during the months he spent immersed in Uganda's rich culture, the interesting people he met, and the incredible sights to which he bore witness.

Sarah Jackson is an award-winning writer and Senior Lecturer at Nottingham Trent University. Sarah's publications include Tactile Poetics (2015) and Pelt (2012), which was awarded the Seamus Heaney Prize and longlisted for the Guardian First Book Award.

An BBC / AHRC New Generation Thinker, she is currently exploring the relationship between the telephone and literature and she has recently edited Ten Poems on the Telephone, published by Candlestick Press (2017).

She will be discussing the relationship between literature and calling, including John Giorno's celebrated 'Dial-a-Poem' service established in 1969 after a phone call between Giorno and William Burroughs.

#### The Camera Obscura

My first taste of photography was at the RAE Farnborough where as a junior researcher I had the responsibility for a darkroom, developing 35mm film and making prints. Later, after a career taking in electronic engineering at Marconi's and then science and technology in education, I completed a Restoration Studies course in retirement specialising in scientific instruments. This included a period as an intern at The Museum of History of Science, Oxford University where I produced a reproduction of an early 19th Century camera obscura in 2002. Since then I've made camera obscuras for The National Trust, The Bodleian Library and exhibited at Lacock Abbey the birthplace of photography.

There will be an illustrated talk demonstration and chance to get a closer look at the camera.

# The Vaughan Williams Affair Janet Tenant and Keith Alldritt

The composer Vaughan Williams, best known for 'The Lark Ascending', 'Fantasia on a Theme' by Thomas Tallis and nine powerful symphonies, was born in 1872, his second wife Ursula died in 2007. For twenty years, from 1938 until 1958, the lives of these two people, separated in age by two generations, by life experience and from very different backgrounds, came together.

Author Keith Alldritt has written the latest biography of the composer, 'Vaughan Williams, Composer, Radical, Patriot – A Biography'. Janet Tennant recently published 'Mistress and Muse – Ursula, the Second Mrs Vaughan Williams'.

Together Keith and Janet will show how the lives of both Vaughan Williams and Ursula were changed by their affair, how she affected his music and he her poetry and how other relationships affected both their lives.

## The English Civil War in Sherwood Forest

Nottinghamshire holds a unique place in the history of the English Civil War of 1642-46. The county witnessed both the opening moments of the action with the Raising of the Royal Standard at Nottingham and the surrender of Charles I at Kelham. Away from the front, Sherwood Forest offers the

opportunity to view the anxieties, fear and turmoil or ordinary people caught up in the political, religious, economic and social turbulence of the age. James Wright FSA is an archaeologist currently studying for a doctorate at the University of Nottingham. He has conducted fieldwork and research on many Early Modern buildings used during the English Civil War throughout Nottinghamshire and beyond


### Treasures of Roman Nottinghamshire Mark Patterson

Although little of the Roman presence in Nottinghamshire remains above ground today the reminders of Roman civilisation are surprisingly abundant. In this illustrated talk Mark Patterson looks at various 'lost' villas, buried forts, hidden roads and some fascinating examples of Roman 'bling.'

Mark Patterson is a trained journalist who has worked in the media for more than 20 years. He is the author of Roman Nottinghamshire and Roman Derbyshire (both published by Five Leaves in Nottingham), Trent Basin: A History and essays found in the anthologies Maps (Five Leaves) and More Raw Material (Lucifer Press)
