WELCOME TO THE FIRST NOTTINGHAM FESTIVAL OF LITERATURE, BUILT ON THE FOUNDATIONS OF NOTTINGHAM FESTIVAL OF WORDS (2013, 2014) AND ON NOTTINGHAM'S NEW GLOBAL ACCOLADE: UNESCO CITY OF LITERATURE STATUS.

The City of Literature's values depict Nottingham as a "knowledge economy" and this Festival sets out to be a platform for those exchanges, exploring the concerns of a modern, diverse city. We will welcome writers, speakers and activists from the UK and abroad, writing across all genres. Virtual writer in residence

A SERIES OF DIGITAL **ENCOUNTERS WITH OMAR** EL HAZEK GIVE INSIGHT INTO THE PLIGHT OF WRITERS WHOSE LIVES ARE OVERSHADOWED BY POLITICAL OPPRESSION.

Omar is a novelist, award-winning poet and campaigner for freedom of expression. He is published in English and Arabic. He was formerly employed by the Library of Alexandria in Egypt. He was arrested in Egypt in December 2013 and served two years in prison for 'protesting without permission' while demonstrating in support of the family of a man beaten to death whilst in police custody. While in prison he was adopted as an Honorary Member of Austrian PEN and Danish PEN. In September 2015 he was one of a hundred prisoners pardoned by a presidential decree.

In early 2016 Hazek was refused permission to travel to the Netherlands to accept the Oxfam Novib/PEN Award for Freedom of Expression - given annually to honour writers who have fought for freedom of expression in the face of great adversity and despite the risk to their own lives. Hazek was detained at Cairo airport, questioned, and later released, but banned from travelling.

SHEILA ROWBOTHAM: REBEL CROSSINGS

TUESDAY 8 NOV 7.30-9PM NOTTINGHAM ARTS THEATRE / NGI 3BE

Sheila Rowbotham helped start the women's liberation movement in Britain and is known internationally as an historian of feminism and radical social movements. She is the author of the ground-breaking books Women, Resistance and Revolution; Woman's Consciousness, Man's World; and Hidden from History.

Curiosity aroused by a book in the British Library during the 1970s led Rowbotham to trace the interweaving lives of six women and men. Rebel Crossings: Transatlantic Feminism, Free Love, and Radicalism is the resulting group biography, set in the late-nineteenth century when liberalism,



feminism, socialism, and anarchism intermingled with alternative approaches to dress, health and sex. Rebel Crossings offers fascinating perspectives on the historical interaction of these trends and the effect on women seeking emancipation.

Michael Symmons Roberts' Selected Poems brings together the best work from six remarkable collections. Professor of Poetry at Manchester Metropolitan University, Michael has won the Forward Prize, the Costa Poetry Prize and the Whitbread Poetry Award, and been shortlisted for the T.S. Eliot Prize. Further acclaim has come for the non-fiction book, Edgelands, co-written with Paul Farley, and his extensive work for radio.

Alison Moore's first novel, The Lighthouse, was shortlisted for the Man Booker Prize, and along with her second novel, He Wants, was Observer Book of the Year. A third novel, Death and the Seaside, is out now. Her short fiction has been broadcast on BBC Radio 4 Extra and collected in The Pre-War House and Other Stories.

Shamim Azad has published novels, short stories and poetry in English and Bengali. She is a resident poet and storyteller with Apples & Snakes, and founder and chair of Bishwo Shahitto Kendro (World Literature Centre) London.

Amir Darwish is a British/Syrian poet who came to the UK as an asylum seeker during the Second Gulf War. His poetry has been published around the world and his collection *Don't Forget the Couscous* was published in the UK in 2015.

Joanna Cannon's debut novel The Trouble with Goats and Sheep was described by The Independent as "a sympathetic and nuanced portrait of society's misfits." In the heatwave of summer 1976, two schoolgirls unearth long-buried secrets whilst investigating the disappearance of their neighbour. The novel explores what it is to belong, and how we treat those who don't. Joanna, also a psychiatric doctor, has an interest in people on the fringes of society and the borders of sanity.



Cathy Rentzenbrink's memoir The Last Act of Love has had a huge impact since its publication in 2015. An extraordinary story of loss and survival, the book charts Cathy's childhood before and after her brother Matty suffers a horrific accident. The decade that follows sees Cathy and her family suffer guilt and pain as they grapple with the hardest decision they've ever had to face. AN EVENING WITH GILLIAN SLOVO

Gillian Slovo is a playwright and the author of thirteen books, including five crime novels, the courtroom drama Red Dust, which was made into a feature film starring Hilary Swank and Chiwetel Ejiofor, and the Orange Prize-shortlisted Ice Road. She co-authored the play Guantanamo – Honor Bound to Defend Freedom, which was staged internationally. Gillian Slovo was President of English PEN from 2010 to 2013 and is a fellow of the Royal Society of Literature. She was born in South Africa, the daugher of leading Communists Ruth First and Joe Slovo, describing her family background in Every Secret Thing.

The political drama within her latest novel, Ten Days, is informed by Gillian's research for her play The Riots, for which she interviewed many of the different players involved in the 2011 London riots. Gillian's latest play Another World: Losing Our Children to Islamic State which focuses on women in ISIS was played at the National Theatre in April 2016.

JENN ASHWORTH & JON MCGREGOR: IN CONVERSATION

Jenn Ashworth's first novel, A Kind of Intimacy, was published in 2009 and won a Betty Trask Award. In 2011 Cold Light was published by Sceptre and she was one of The Culture Show's twelve Best New British Novelists. Fell is her fourth novel, and in the writing of it Jenn was grateful for the critical ear of writer Jon McGregor.

Jon was named one of the Guardian's 'top ten writers to see live'. He is Professor of creative writing at the University of Nottingham and his novels include If Nobody Speaks of Remarkable Things, Even the Dogs, and the forthcoming Reservoir 13 (4th Estate, April 2017).

Here they talk about their respective writing careers and latest works, but also about the intrinsic value of one writer to another, and the process of unravelling and developing a novel: points of view, landscapes that become characters in their own right, and narrators who are not what they seem.



WENDY JONES: SEX LIVES OF **ENGLISH WOMEN**

In the 700 years that books have been published in England, there has not been one that invites women to talk about what they want from sex. Wendy Jones thought it was about time someone had the courtesy to ask, so she went out with a tape recorder and spoke to twenty-four women from all walks of life. They talk about their everyday lives, families, partners, bodies and sexual histories, about what they have learnt, how they have been hurt, what they enjoy and what they long for. The interviews are frank, engaging and often astonishing.

Wendy Jones has published two novels and co-authored Portrait of the Artist as a Young Girl, a biography of Grayson Perry.

A MESSAGE FROM OVER THE WALL - KATHARINE QUARMBY

American author and disability advocate Hugh Gregory Gallagher wrote eloquently of the "land of the 'crippled", adding, "a great wall surrounds this place, and most of what goes within this wall is unknown to those outside it. What follows is a message from over the wall." In this address, Katharine Quarmby will explore the canon of literature to look at the characterization of disability, as a message within both mainstream literature and and emerging disability literature. For writing about disability – invisible and visible – is a message about humanity itself, and the stories we tell ourselves about what it means to be human, and to live with impairment.

Katharine Quarmby is a writer, journalist and Royal Literary Fund Fellow at the London School of Economics. Her nonfiction works include Scapegoat: Why We Are Failing Disabled People, which won the Ability Media International Award, and No Place to Call Home: Inside the Real Lives of Gypsies and Travellers. She has worked with the BBC, the Economist, Newsweek Europe, and is currently a contributor for Mosaic Science. She has been shortlisted for the Paul Foot award for many years of campaigning journalism on disability affairs.

Can games be poems? Can poems be games? Curated by the National Videogame Arcade's writerin-residence, Abigail Parry, and game-poetry PhD researcher Jon Stone, this exhibition explores the potential for literary videogaming, of mixing Shakespeare and space shooters, tercets and text adventures, to create new hybrid artefacts that read and play in new and unexpected ways. 
