VE Day and VJ Day

Commemorating the End of the Second World War in Europe and the Pacific

The conclusion of the Second World War is marked by two pivotal dates: VE Day and VJ Day. These days commemorate the formal end of fighting in Europe and the Pacific, respectively, and remain significant for their historical, cultural, and emotional impact.

VE Day stands for "Victory in Europe Day". It is celebrated on 8 May each year and marks the official surrender of Nazi Germany to the Allied forces in 1945, effectively ending the war in Europe. On this day, the Allies accepted Germany's unconditional surrender, which was signed in Reims, France, on 7 May and ratified in Berlin on 8 May. Across Europe and the Commonwealth, VE Day was greeted with spontaneous celebrations, street parties, and gatherings. For many, it was a moment of relief and joy after six years of conflict, though tempered by the memory of those who had been lost or wounded.

VJ Day stands for "Victory over Japan Day". It marks the day when Japan surrendered to the Allies, bringing an end to the war in the Pacific and thus to the Second World War as a whole. The surrender was announced on 15 August 1945, although the formal signing occurred on 2 September 1945 aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay. VJ Day was celebrated worldwide, with similar scenes of jubilation and relief. In the United Kingdom, 15 August is commemorated as VJ Day. The end of fighting in the Pacific was particularly significant because it followed two atomic bombings in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, events that remain controversial and impactful in world history.

Both VE Day and VJ Day are observed in the United Kingdom and other countries with ceremonies, memorials, and moments of reflection. These days offer opportunities to honour those who served, remember the sacrifices made, and reflect on the impact of war.

In recent years, commemorations have included efforts to educate younger generations about the history and consequences of war, ensuring that the lessons and memories endure.

VE Day and VJ Day represent moments of immense historical importance, symbolising the triumph of unity and resilience in the face of adversity. They continue to be observed as reminders of the price of peace and the enduring value of remembrance.

As we gather today for this Service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving, we remember the service and sacrifice of those who fought, and continue to fight, to defend our democratic freedoms. We also give thanks for peacekeepers helping countries to navigate the challenging path from conflict to peace. And we are mindful of the ongoing conflict and violence in many places where we hope and pray for a more peaceful future.
