Flanders Field, Ypres

In World War 1 the Western Front contained in the soil thousands of poppy seeds, all lying dormant. They would have lain there for years more, but the battles being fought there churned up the soil so much that the poppies bloomed like never before. In 1921, the Royal British Legion was formed, and the poppy was adopted as their emblem. In the same year, the first Poppy Day was launched helping to shape our modern-day Act of Remembrance and Thanksgiving.

Service, the act of defending and protecting a nation's democratic freedom and way of life, is rarely without cost to those who serve. Physical, mental or emotional injury or trauma; the absence of time with loved ones; or the ongoing pressures that come from serving, highlight why the Act of Remembrance and Thanksgiving is so important, honouring those who laid down their own life for others, and those who continue to risk their own safety through serving in our armed forces today.

This year particularly the Royal British Legion marks the 70th Anniversary of the armistice which ended the fighting of the Korean War; this war resulted in the death of 3 million people, including those from British and Commonwealth forces who served in almost unimaginable conditions. 2023 also marks 60 years since the last National Servicemen were demobbed when, following the National Service Act in 1949, more than 2 million served through National Service conscription to the British Army, Royal Navy or Royal Air Force. In this 75th anniversary year of the arrival of settlers from the Caribbean on the Empire Windrush, we also remember the connections between the armed forces and the Windrush Generation, as well as the part they played in rebuilding post war Britain.

As we gather together for this year's Act of Remembrance, we are mindful of the increased conflict and violence in Israel and Gaza, as well as ongoing wars being fought across the world from Afghanistan to Yemen. May we remember in our prayers all those who continue to suffer as a result of war.
